A guide to hospital and community continence services

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Introduction

Problems with leaking urine or faeces can be really embarrassing and affect a person's quality of life. Continence services for Leicester, Leicestershire and Rutland, provide a holistic and sensitive service which aims to assess, treat and educate patients with self-help advice to improve bladder or bowel symptoms. This may include lifestyle advice, pelvic floor assessment and exercises, bladder retraining, intermittent catheterisation, food/ fluid and toileting advice, as well as medication if needed. Continence services aim to give you the confidence to self manage your symptoms by teaching behavioural and lifestyle changes that can promote bladder and bowel health.

Continence services are delivered in both the community (patient's home, care home or in clinic), and in Leicester's hospitals (for inpatients and outpatients). This leaflet explains the differences between both services, how to get referred, and what to expect.

- If you are an inpatient at one of Leicester's hospitals, the Adult Continence Service covers Leicester Royal Infirmary, Leicester General and Glenfield Hospital.
- If you have been referred as an outpatient you will be seen at the Adult Continence Service Clinic which is called the Castleden Bladder and Bowel Clinic, located at Leicester General Hospital. There are 2 clinics:



- a consultant led clinic (with specialist nurse support) for bladder and bowel problems in adults with complex medical conditions, or people over 65 years of age who are frail or have more than one medical condition.

- a nurse led clinic for patients with neurological conditions e.g. multiple sclerosis or Parkinson's disease.

• The Community Continence Service Team see patients in their home, care home or in clinic. Telephone and online video assessments are available. If you are an inpatient at one of the community hospitals/ wards you will be assessed in relation to your symptoms and referred to the Community Continence Team if needed.

Who provides continence pads?	Continence pads will be provided for all inpatients if needed by the ward areas. What will my assessment involve?

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The table below tells you what examinations to expect in a Level 1 and Level 2 assessment. Examinations are an important tool for diagnosing and treating bladder and bowel problems.

All hospital inpatients are offered a Level 1 and 2 assessment by the Continence Nurse Specialist. If you are an outpatient at the Castleden Clinic you will have a Level 2 assessment.

Patients seen by the community service will initially receive a Level 1 assessment, and be referred for a Level 2 assessment with a Continence Lead Nurse in the community if needed.
