

Care after your lithotripsy treatment for kidney stones

What should I do after my lithotripsy treatment?

- do not drive for 24 hours.
- **please drink plenty of fluids after the treatment**. Try to drink between 2 to 3 litres (4 to 6 pints) per day. This will help the stone fragments to pass in your pee (urine).

What to look out for when you are home

Infection: Sometimes infection can happen because bacteria is released from the stone as it breaks. If you start to get

- flu like symptoms,
- a high temperature (fever),
- feel shivery
- or feel unwell

you must call one of the numbers on page 2 urgently. You may need antibiotics to treat this.

Blood in your pee: You may see blood in your pee for a few days after the procedure. This is quite common and is due to the stones breaking up and moving. This should clear by drinking plenty of fluids.

Pain: The passage of small stone fragments out of your body may cause you some pain. If you have any pain/discomfort you should take the same painkillers as you would for a headache. If this is does not work call one of the numbers on page 2.

Bruising on your back: You may also have some localised redness where the shockwaves were directed on your skin. This may sometimes be tender or sore but will slowly reduce.
