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You will have discussed your treatment programme with a member of your healthcare team and received written information about LEAM chemotherapy and stem cell transplants.

The diary lists when you will need to attend the Hambleton Suite and which days to rest at home. Please bring this with you on each visit so that we can add any additional notes.

You will receive some of your treatment through a pump called the CADD Solis pump which you take home with you in a specially designed bag. You and your main carer will have already been given information on how to care for the pump and what to do if you have any problems.

Daily life with the pump

You will be given a CADD Solis pump which will be connected to your PICC line at the hospital (You will receive separate information about PICC lines). You will then go home with the pump and it will be programmed to deliver some of your chemotherapy treatments when you are in your own home. You will be given your own bag to put the CADD Solis pump into to help you keep it safe and for ease for you. This can either be worn around the waist or over the shoulder.

Dressing

Choose wide sleeved clothes to carefully feed the line up through the sleeve, ensuring there is no 'bend' in the line

Showering

Put the black bag into a plastic bag and hang out of the spray of the shower, locate in a dry place and try to keep the shower time to a minimum to prevent a build-up of steam in the bathroom

Bathing

Place the pump on a chair beside the bath. Avoid having a long hot soak for the same reason as the shower

Sleeping

Either place the pump under your pillow if the line permits, the bag may be worn or it can be placed on a chair or table beside the bed. Try to have the pump either at the same level or above your body level to aid infusion

Charging the pump

You will need to monitor the battery life on the pump to ensure it doesn't run out but it will give you a warning bleep as it begins to get low. You may find that the best time to charge the pump is while sitting down during the day/evening. This way you do not need to worry about being connected overnight

As with all electrical equipment, the pump must not get wet. If the pump is accidentally dropped into water, take out quickly, dry off with a towel and call the hospital.

Your medicines

These are the regular medicines that you have been prescribed to take by the doctors looking after you. if you are already on other regular medications we will advise you whether to continue taking them.

The day you have your stem cells returned is referred to as **day 0**. Any day of treatment before this is called **day minus**, any day after this is referred to as **day plus**.

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Your notes during the treatment phase (Days –7 to Day 0)

Post transplant care day +1 onwards

You will continue to be looked after as an outpatient for a few days until you become neutropenic. Neutropenia or being neutropenic means that you have very few white cells in your blood (specifically neutrophils) to fight infection and would need help from antibiotics to do so.

You will be admitted earlier if you are unwell or if your investigations suggest you may become so. You can also ask at any point to be admitted if you feel you need to be.

You will be admitted onto either Ward 41 in the Osborne Building or Bone Marrow Transplant Unit in the Windsor Building.

During your time as an outpatient, it is very important that you ring the haematology helpline at any time day or night if you are in any way unwell, even if you have seen or are due to see the doctor. Please continue to monitor your temperature am and pm and repeat if you feel unwell. If your temperature is 37.5°C or above or below 36°C please call us straight away.
